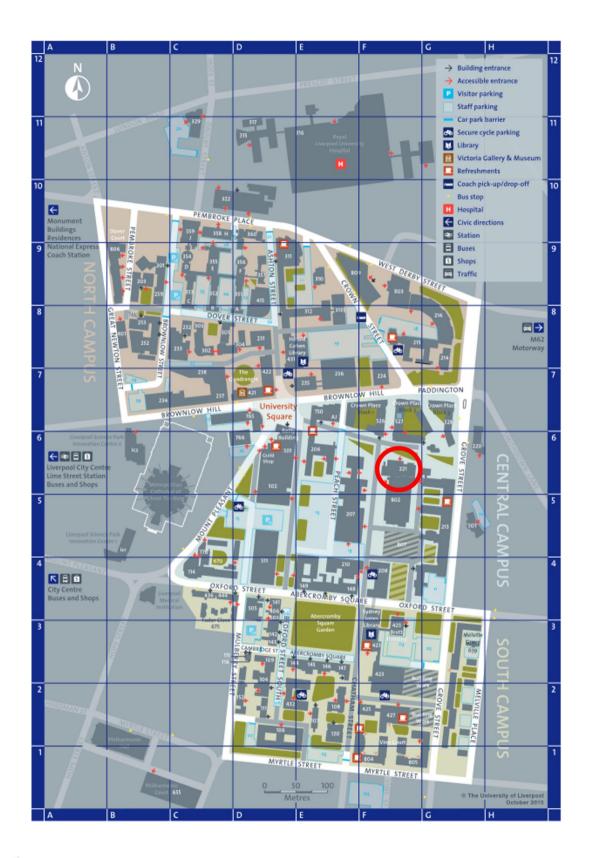
This venue is fully compliant with the Disability Discrimination Act (1995), equipped with:

#### **Presentation formats**

#### 20-minute standard presentations

- Standard presentations are 20-minutes followed by a 5-minute question and answer session.
- At the end of each presentation, there will be a 5-minute break to allow for conference participants to move between rooms.
- There will be four parallel sessions taking place, with each session lasting 1-2 hours, followed by a longer break.

#### **10-minute short presentations**

- Short presentations are 10-minutes long, and will take place during dedicated sessions.
- These presentations will be presented in a series of six consecutive talks followed by a break.

#### **Posters**

- Posters must be printed in A0 (1189 x 841 mm).
- Posters must have a vertical orientation.
- A poster must contain:
  - o The presenter's name.
  - o The presenter's affiliate institution.
  - o The presenter's contact details.
- Additional design choices are at the discretion of the presenters.

#### For presenters who are unable to attend CRE 2024 in-person:

- Oral presentations may be presented digitally.
- Posters may be sent physically or via email and will be displayed, by prior arrangement.

- If you have previously stated your need to present remotely during your abstract submission, there is no need to inform us again, unless your situation changes.

#### **Visas**

For participants from outside Europe, you may require a valid visa to attend. You can check if you need a visa by visiting the UK Government's <a href="Check if you need a UK visa page">Check if you need a UK visa page</a>.

#### **Participants from Egypt**

Participants from Egypt will be required to have a Standard Visitor Visa:

• Visit the UK as a Standard Visitor: Visit as an academic

A Standard Visitor Visa costs GBP 115 and is valid for six months.

Applications must be submitted online no earlier than three months before your travel (in this case, beginning of June 2024). Applications can be submitted to <u>Visit the UK as a Standard Visitor: Apply for a Standard Visitor visa</u>.

We recommend that you apply early to be sure you will receive your visa in time for the conference.

#### Requirements

You must have a valid passport or travel document to enter the UK. It should be valid for the whole of your stay.

You must be able to show that:

- You will leave the UK at the end of your visit.
- You are able to support yourself and your dependents during your trip (or have funding from someone else to support you).
- You are able to pay for your return or onward journey (or have funding from someone else to pay for the journey).
- You will not live in the UK for extended periods through frequent or successive visits, or make the UK your main home.

You will also be asked to provide your biometrics (fingerprints and facial photograph). If you have not done this before, you must submit this information through one of the recognised UK Visa application centres.

There will be specialists who can help you through your application process. You can find an overview of the necessary documents at <a href="How to apply">How to apply (passport collection)</a>.

Participants from Egypt and Sudan should check their inboxes for additional communications from the Organising Committee regarding visa applications.

#### Travel advice and information

#### **Getting to the UK and Liverpool**

Liverpool John Lennon Airport (LPL)

- LPL is the closest airport to Liverpool.
- From this airport you can either get the city's bus services or metro rail service (called Merseyrail) to the city centre.
- Both services cost approximately £5 for the journey. For the direct metro service: walk to Hunts Cross Station and take the railway to the city centre. Tickets can be purchased at the station through the ticket window. Journey times take an average of 45 minutes.
- For direct bus routes to the city centre: you can catch either the 500, 80A, 82A, or 86A. Please note that the journey time varies depending on which bus you take.
  - Alternatively, you can catch the 86A or 80A to Liverpool South Parkway station and board the metro there to the city centre.

#### Manchester Airport (MAN)

- MAN is the second closest international airport to Liverpool.
- Many people find this airport the most convenient to travel to.
- You can get to Liverpool either by train or bus from MAN.
- Trains
  - A regular train service operates between Manchester Airport Station (MIA) and Liverpool Lime Street Station (LIV).
  - Other train routes include going to Manchester Oxford Road Station (MCO) and changing to a train that goes to Liverpool.
  - Trains from Manchester to Liverpool range from £5 to £20 depending on the service. The journey takes approximately 1 hour 20 minutes.
- Bus
  - National Express buses also run from the Manchester Airport Station to Liverpool.
  - Buses typically cost between £3 and £10, with the journey taking approximately 1 hour.
  - Please note, buses will make several stops across Liverpool, including the University of Liverpool (Brownlow Hill).

#### Birmingham International Airport (BHX)

- BHX is a third commonly used option.
- A rail service runs from Birmingham International Station (BHI) to Crewe (CRE), where you change and catch a direct train service to Liverpool.
- Train journeys from Birmingham cost approximately £37 to £50 and take around 2 hours 15 minutes.

#### Other airports you can consider flying into:

- You can fly into any of the major London airports (Heathrow, Gatwick, Luton, Stansted, or London City Airport).
- Upon arriving you can go to London Euston Station, either by bus, train, and/or London Underground services.
- You can take a train from London Euston Station (EUS) to Liverpool (LVL).
- This journey costs between £42 and £72, depending on time of day.
- The journey takes around 2 hours 30 minutes.
- Alternatively, bus/coach services cost around £15 to £40 and take around 5 to hours
- If you are flying into London Heathrow (LHR), you can travel to Manchester by domestic/internal flight for approximately £100. The journey takes around 1 hour.

We recommend coming into either Liverpool or Manchester airports, with most major European cities having connections to these airports.

If you do plan on coming to the UK by way of London (as sometimes this is the only or least expensive option) and require help or advice planning your journey to Liverpool, please do get in touch with us.

#### Useful travel aides and extra information

Travelling by train in the UK

- Trainline
  - You can find trains for anywhere in the UK using the <u>Trainline website</u> or Trainline mobile app (available through various app stores).
  - You can use the website or mobile app to pay for tickets.
  - We recommend downloading and using the Trainline mobile app as you can keep track of specific trains and will be notified of any delays.
  - There is a £1.50 booking fee using Trainline
- National Rail
  - If you wish to avoid the booking fee, you can visit and purchase tickets through the <u>National Rail website</u>.

If you purchase train tickets either through Trainline or National Rail but have to collect your train tickets at the station, you will be emailed a booking reference number.

You will use this booking reference number to collect your tickets either at a ticket desk or designated ticket collection machine. You must provide the card you paid for the tickets on when collecting your tickets.

You do not need to reserve a seat on trains as all trains must provide unreserved seating. However, you can reserve a seat when you purchase your ticket, usually at no extra cost.

There are many options when purchasing a ticket:

- Open single tickets (this means you can catch any train available for this ticket).\*
- Open return tickets (this means you can catch any train to return back your original location).\*
- Tickets for specific trains and times.

\*When purchasing these tickets, make sure to read the conditions of the ticket, as some tickets may only permit you travel with specific operates or via specific routes.

#### **Exploring Liverpool**

Here we have given a brief overview of the different places you can visit and explore. You can find more detailed information at <u>Visit Liverpool</u>.

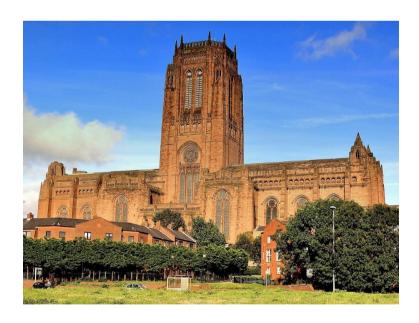

#### **Cathedrals**

Check out the Liverpool and Liverpool Metropolitan cathedrals, a must for any visitor. Both cathedrals are free to visit.

Liverpool Cathedral is the world's longest, built in the 1900s in the Gothic Revival Style. For a small fee, you can climb to the top of the cathedral's town for a 360° of Liverpool. Next to the cathedral is also St James's Cemetery/Gardens, an early example of a garden cemetery. For more information, please see <u>Liverpool</u> Cathedral.

The Liverpool Metropolitan Cathedral is a unique building built in the 1960s with a more modern design. For more information, please see <u>Liverpool Metropolitan</u> Cathedral.





#### The Docks

The Docks are both an historic and cultural point of the city.

You will see the Liver Building, built 1911, topped with two Liver Birds, the emblems of the City of Liverpool.

Other places along the Docks that are must visits include:

- <u>Tate Gallery</u> (temporarily moved)
- The Beatles Story Museum
- Museum of Liverpool
- Maritime Museum
- International Slavery Museum

Dotted around the Docks are many restaurants, food places, and a few shops.

Please note, the World Museum, Liverpool's largest museum, is not located at the Docks, but rather in St George's Quarter. The World Museum hosts one of the most extensive collections of Egyptian artefacts in the UK.

Next to the World Museum is also the Walker Art Gallery.

#### **Bold Street**

When visiting Liverpool, you shouldn't miss out on Bold Street!

Located near Central Station, Bold Street is full of many restaurants that provide a huge variety of different cuisines.

At one end of the street, you will find St Luke's Church, which was bombed but surprisingly its tower remained intact. You can walk around its perimeter and read its history and often attend markets held within.



#### **Formby Beach**

For you nature lovers, Formby Beach provides extensive sand dunes and a stunning coastline. If you plan it right, you can see prehistoric footprints and view two shipwrecks.

You can get to Formby by taking the Merseyrail from Liverpool Central Station, with the journey taking about 30 minutes.

#### Speke Hall

One of Liverpool's hidden gems, Speke Hall is located close to the city's airport. A Tudor-period house, restored in the 1800s, Speke Hall is surrounded by beautiful gardens.

#### **North West and Wales**

If you plan on spending extra time in the UK, the North West outside of Liverpool and North Wales has much to offer, including a range of historic cities, beaches, vibrant modern metropoleis, and much more.

#### **Manchester & Surrounding Area**

With direct train services going between Liverpool and Manchester, you can visit many of this city's amazing sites.

As the excursion for this CRE is going to Manchester, you can check out some of the amazing sites that the city has to offer in the 'Excursion' section on page 12.

#### **Historic City of Chester**

Chester is easy to get to by Merseyrail, taking approximately 45 minutes from Liverpool and return tickets costing around £8. The city dates back to Roman times, with many of its Roman features still present in the city today, such as its main street and its Roman amphitheatre. Chester's history spans from Roman times, through the mediaeval and Tudor periods until the present day. Chester is a very walkable city, so if you get a chance do visit.





#### **Exploring North Wales**

The North Wales coastline is connected by rail and can be explored by taking the Merseyrail to Chester, and then a train into North Wales. North Wales boasts:

- Stunning coastline landscapes
- Beaches, such as Colwyn Bay Beach
- Many mediaeval castles, built during the 13<sup>th</sup> Century, like <u>Conwy Castle</u> and <u>Caernarfon Castle</u>
- <u>The Great Orme</u> (Bronze Age copper mines, an Iron Age Hillfort, and a sixth-century church)
- The 15th-century Penrhyn Castle and Gardens
- On the Welsh-English border, Chirk Castle

#### Walking and Hiking

For those interested in walking and hiking, there are a number of national parks in the North West and North Wales. We recommend finding accommodation nearby if you are interested in these.

- Delamere Forest, Cheshire
- The Peak District
- Eryri | Snowdonia, Wales
